
U.S. COVID-19 Vaccine Doses Administered by Vaccine Type




Deaths Per Million in Places with Very Different Lockdowns





A new study from the National Bureau of Economic Research has found that 87% of COVID-19 coverage in national U.S. media last year was negative. The share was 51% in international media, 53% in U.S. regional media and 64% in scientific journals. The negativity of the U.S. major media is notable even in areas with positive developments including school re-openings and vaccine trials. Media negativity is unresponsive to changing trends in new COVID-19 cases or the political leanings of the audience.²

Daily Reported COVID-19 Cases by U.S. Regions, **Normalized by Population**


